BUILDING ARTS PROGRAMME 2024



THE BUILDING ARTS PROGRAMME AIMS TO INSPIRE A FUTURE GENERATION OF ARTISTS, CRAFTSPEOPLE, DESIGNERS AND MAKERS TO CREATE A BUILT ENVIRONMENT WHICH DRAWS ON A VAST ARRAY OF DIFFERENT SKILLS, MATERIALS AND PROCESSES. THROUGH PRACTICE-BASED LEARNING PARTICIPANTS WILL EXPLORE THE PHYSICAL, TEMPORAL AND EVEN SYMBOLIC CONNECTIONS WHICH CAN BE CONVEYED THROUGH OUR BUILDINGS AND PLACES.

INTRODUCTION

Launched in February 2020 the Building Arts Programme is delivered through a collaboration between The King's Foundation (formerly The Prince's Foundation) and QEST (Queen Elizabeth Scholarship Trust).

Over a period of 8-months students from a broad range of discipline areas will learn together, exploring both the interdisciplinary nature of architecture, the decorative arts and traditional craft, and the role that these practices can continue to play in shaping the world around us.

Through a programme of practical workshops, group discussion, collaborative projects and industry placements the Building Arts Programme aims to provide a platform for students to explore and challenge the preconception that 'craft' within our built environment is something which is purely confined to our past.

The Building Arts Programme aims to nurture those who think with their hands and inspire students to utilise these skills through the creation of our built environment. Ideas are nothing without the ability to give them shape, and it is through the Building Arts Programme that students will expand both their understanding of our built environment, but also enhance their practical skills in order to realise their ideas. Projecting these above the commonplace.

At the heart of the Building Arts Programme is the idea that our built environment is a collaboration between a vast array of different discipline areas which are all fundamentally linked and interrelated. Current practice, both educationally and vocationally, is to separate and teach these principles independently – the Building Arts Programme will look to provide a space for rediscovering shared learning and practice, enabling students to explore the multifaceted nature of the built environment and their role within it.

Throughout the 8-month programme students will take part in a series of lectures, visits and practical workshops which will demonstrate the holistic nature of our built environment, as well as expanding their hand skills, and ultimately refining their practice. Students will engage with the built environment from the perspective of the urban form and the people that occupy it, right down to the materiality and symbolism of its decoration and ornament. During a period of industry placements students will have the opportunity to learn first-hand from master craftspeople and leading practitioners from across the UK, learning new skills and expanding their network as they carve their own path within the sector.

Through working collaboratively and learning alongside other like-minded people, students will acquire a dialogue which reaches across disciplines. The programme will culminate in the realisation of a real-life brief developed in collaboration with clients and organisations from across the UK. This final project will be an opportunity to work both together and independently in order to truly demonstrate the interdependent nature of the building arts.

BUILDING — ARTS — PROGRAMME

- To demonstrate the value of traditional craftsmanship within the built environment both historically and in the creation of new spaces and places.
- To build connections throughout the craft sector which broadens understanding and supports interdisciplinary practice.

This three-week programme introduces the fundamental underpinnings of The King's Foundation and QEST's approach to the craft and the building arts. Delivered as a series of talks, visits and workshops the introductory course will focus thinking and frame conversations within the context of the built environment. You will explore and discuss the value of craft today and the role that traditional craftsmanship has played throughout history. As well as theory and discussion you will take part in various workshops which encourage you to observe and analyse the world around you.

The Introductory
Programme will take place

with visits taking place

This element of the course consists of a series of intensive week-long practical workshops, taught by leading practitioners.
Within this aspect of the programme you will explore ideas surrounding ornamentation, decoration, structure, form and function.
Discussion will be layered throughout to build upon technical understanding of processes and materials.

will be delivered in two blocks of four weeks. The first block of four weeks will be delivered on the Dumfries House estate in East Ayrshire, the second block of four weeks will be delivered at the Barley Court Workshops on the Highgrove estate in Gloucestershire.

Interdisciplinary Workshops

Industry Placements are a chance for you to hone your skills within your individual area of expertise and interests within the context of the built environment sector. Placements are arranged by The King's Foundation and QEST using our network of practitioners and we encourage you to work collaboratively with the programme manager to identify placements that best suit your interests.

Placements are typically on an individual basis and will take place across the UK.

Participants will typically take part in two to three separate placements.

The programme will culminate with a Final Project which will encourage you to showcase the role of your craft within the creation of the built environment whilst working collaboratively the group and with other discipline areas.

The Final Project will focus on a location within travelling distance of the Dumfries House estate.

Depending on the focus of your project you may need to access specialist facilities and expertise further afield.

BUSINESS SKILLS

During the early stages of the Final Project you will join students on The King's Foundation Building Craft Programme and participate in a week-long Business Skills course. This course will introduce you to many of the core skills required to set up and run a business within the built environment sector.

FURTHER Information

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

The King's Foundation and QEST welcome applications from individuals working across a broad range of craft disciplines. However please note that the Building Arts Programme is not an entry level training course and therefore applicants must be able to demonstrate a high level of proficiency in their individual area of practice to date.

Each year the programme hosts up to a **maximum of eight participants**. Participants are selected via a process of application, shortlisting, and interview. Within each cohort we are looking to bring together a diverse range of backgrounds and disciplines and are seeking applications from candidates working in areas such as:

ARCHITECTURE & DESIGN - Interiors, Structures, Engineering, Landscape Design, Planning, Product Design

BUILDING CRAFTS - Carpentry, Joinery, Stonemasonry, Plasterwork, Metalwork, Brickwork, Natural Building

DECORATIVE AND APPLIED ARTS - Glasswork, Ceramics, Painting, Print, Illustration, Sculpture, Textiles

(Please note this list is not exhaustive)

Fundamental to your application is being able to demonstrate an aspiration to explore and develop your role as a craftsperson within the creation of the built environment. To be considered for a place on the Building Arts Programme 2024 applicants must be able to demonstrate the following within their application form and/or portfolio:

- At least 3 years' experience of practicing your discipline post training/education.
- Demonstrable experience of working within the built environment, and a desire to develop this further.
- Demonstrable experience of working collaboratively with others.
- Demonstrable experience of working to project briefs independently.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

The King's Foundation is proud to offer educational opportunities to students from all around the world. Should you require a visa to study or work in the UK, it is important to note that whilst The King's Foundation is a licensed student sponsor, this sponsorship **does not** extend to those undertaking the Building Arts Programme. Therefore, acceptance onto the Building Arts Programme alone is not sufficient to obtain the appropriate visa. Please note that The King's Foundation and/or QEST cannot assist in obtaining a visa.

In most cases you will be required to hold one of the following in order to be eligible for the Building Arts Programme:

- UK Passport Holder
- Settled Status / Indefinite Leave to Remain in the UK
- · Pre-settled Status

If you require a visa to work or study in the UK, please contact the Programme Manager prior to submitting an application. The Building Arts Programme is a fully funded course supported by The King's Foundation, QEST, and with donations from charitable trusts, foundations, and individuals.

All participants of the Building Arts Programme 2024 will be awarded a full scholarship covering the course fees, as well as being provided with a monthly bursary of £1,400.

Participants will be required to arrange and pay for their own travel, accommodation and living costs while on the course. The majority of materials needed for the course will be provided.

The Introductory Programme, Interdisciplinary Workshops, and Final Project will primarily be delivered via the Dumfries House estate, Cumnock, East Ayrshire, Scotland, and Barley Court Workshops on the Highgrove estate in Gloucestershire. Please review the course timetable for further details on the dates which apply to each location.

Participants will be required to arrange and pay for your own accommodation within daily travelling distance from the Dumfries House estate and Highgrove estate as per the course timetable. Short term accommodation may also be required in other areas of the UK.

During the Individual Placement period, participants will be based at various locations around the UK for a period of weeks (generally 3-6 weeks at each location). Participants will be required to arrange and pay for their own accommodation, travel and living costs during the placement period. Specific placement locations cannot be guaranteed, and therefore you may be required to travel to any part of the UK.

On the rare occasion that accommodation is arranged on your behalf, these costs may be deducted from your monthly bursary. As part of a participants attendance on the programme, feedback and evaluation will be required at various points in the course. These reports should reflect the tasks that have been performed and the knowledge acquired.

Reporting and evaluation is a vital part of our agreement with many of the programme sponsors and funders. Each evaluation will be accessible online, and should be completed within the time requirements as set by the Programme Manager, this is typically within one week.

A number of our sponsors and funders may nominate specific students on the programme that they would like to follow more closely during their time on the course. We will inform participants if this is the case and may look to introduce participants to a key contact within the organisation. As part of this nomination participants may be required to provide additional information, complete additional feedback forms, attend specific events, or be featured in specific publicity material.



The Building Arts Programme is a full-time course, commencing on Monday 8th April 2024, and concluding on Friday 13th December 2024.

Breaks are scheduled throughout as per the course timetable. Please note that no holiday leave can be taken outside of this period.

The Building Arts Programme is generally delivered Monday – Friday, 9am - 5pm, however, you may be required to attend additional hours during particular aspects of the course such as the Introductory Programme.

Individual placement providers will advise on your hours of attendance during your Industry Placements

Public Bank Holidays are not generally observed during the Building Arts Programme and as such these are considered as 'normal days'.

A key aspect of the Building Arts Programme will involve participation in up to 10 weeks of Industry Placements with craftspeople and traditional construction companies around the UK.

Industry Placements are arranged on your behalf by The King's Foundation drawing on a extensive network across the sector. There are a number of factors which need to be considered when arranging and confirming placements. Examples of some considerations include:

- Relevance of work in-line with the ethos of the programme.
- Relevance of the work in line with funding requirements.
- Your prior experience.
- · Placement providers workload.
- Placement providers insurance provision.
- Placement providers capacity to monitor a student.
- · Location of placement provider and projects.
- · Duration of placement


In general placements will be at least 3 - 6 weeks in duration as this ensures that you have enough time to settle into a new environment and fully engage with the tasks at hand. You should therefore expect to undertake 2-3 different placements.
